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# Message from the President



#### Welcome back!

Welcome back to what promises to be a busy fulfillina and year! This is true whether this is your very first year of teaching, your very last year of teaching, or if you find yourself somewhere This between. September was the first time since 1998 that I was not in a school on the

opening day! My two-year term as your president began on August first, and I, like many of you, spent the summer recharging and preparing for a busy and fulfilling year.

#### **Teacher Volunteers, CONTACT**

In the first two weeks of August, I had the privilege of working with several different groups of dedicated teachers volunteering their time in service of the profession. The first were the enthusiastic participants and organizers who attended CONTACT in Saint John. Educators not only had the opportunity to network with teachers from throughout the Atlantic provinces, but they were able to partake in learning opportunities and hear from Keynote speakers such as Phillip Sexsmith and Kayia Hemmings! CONTACT is always a fun and beneficial learning experience and I hope you consider attending in the future.

The second group of amazing teachers were the over 100 NBTA branch leaders from across the province that attended our Leadership Conference. I was proud to work with these local leaders as we charted our course to move forward together. Later that week, our 2019-2020 NBTA Executive Committee got together for an orientation session and to take an initial look at some key issues. This important group of teachers, elected not only in their branches but also by their peers on the NBTA Board of Directors, helps direct my work and that of the Association.

#### Leadership

My actions are also guided by the NBTA Strategic Action Plan. Some of the goals of the Plan include securing improvements to classroom composition and the working and learning conditions in our classrooms, including changes to Policy 703 to help address violence in the classrooms. The Plan instructs us to continue to be the voice that demands the resources necessary to meet the goals of Policy 322 (Inclusion), and further to demand proper funding of all new initiatives. Currently schools are expected to "be creative" with their schedules to make many new initiatives happen. Schools should not have to "rob Peter to pay Paul" to meet the many diverse needs of the learners in our classrooms. It is only logical that funding should match policy commitments.

#### **Teacher Wellness & Our Counsellors**

Hand-in-hand with improving the working conditions for teachers is improving teacher wellness and self-care. Teachers are the absolute foundation to the education system and teacher wellness is crucial for their long-term success in this very challenging and rewarding profession. Our school wellness reps do amazing work and they are supported by three wonderful teacher counsellors. I don't know exactly how to put into words how crucial this team is. When teachers are struggling or in crisis they are there, when tragedy strikes a school community, these folks are there. They lend a helping hand in the very darkest of times and when teachers are stretched to their very limits. I heard many times on the campaign trail how important these counsellors are to teachers. But this is only one aspect of their roles. The proactive aspect is in promoting teacher wellness through the wellness reps at each school.

#### **Structures and Services Recommendations**

I am excited to be at the helm as we navigate our way through the recommendations from the comprehensive NBTA Structures and Services Review. This is a period of growth and change for the Association and your Board and Executive Committees will be continuing to consider and make decisions on items such as branch restructuring, elections, and strengthening our relationships both internally and externally. The scope of this work is such that it will continue to unfold throughout my term as president and quite possibly beyond it!

I am truly humbled and honored that the teachers of this province chose me to be their spokesperson. I look forward to the next two years where we all work together to make a positive difference for our profession, our Association and for publicly-funded Public Education. # "We Will Miss You" Heather Smith 1959-2019

Heather Smith passed away on June 30th, 2019. She served her 34-year career as an elementary school teacher in McAdam. Bathurst. and Belledune. then as principal in Janeville for many years. Heather received national recognition being the only New Brunswick educator named by the Learning Partnership as one of Canada's Outstanding Principals in 2011. She was President of the NBTA from 2011-2013 and later, President of the Canadian Teachers' Federation. approximately representing 200.000 educators nation-wide.

The following are excerpts of the eulogy delivered at Heather's funeral in Bathurst by NBTA Deputy Executive Director Ardith Shirley:



ow does one even begin to encapsulate 'Heather Smith'?

While Heather's professional accomplishments are more than impressive, they are nothing when compared to her character - always positive, always professional and just plain wonderful to be around. When Heather walked into the room, you could be sure that FUN was never far behind. Her quick wit, her genuine smile, her contagious laugh and unflappable personality made her someone you just wanted to be around.

Heather's ability to put people at ease, along with her determination and strong work ethic served her well. During her term as NBTA President she established an enviable standard for the position for

anyone who might follow. If an event was occurring, a committee meeting, a branch rep council, a politician in need of reminding, or a reporter to be educated, *Heather was there.* 

Always well read, articulate and interested, she could more than hold her own in any conversation or debate - no matter the topic - AND when it came to public education, I suspect there were few that could hold a candle to her. Her extensive professional background included a Bachelor's degree in Child Studies in Elementary and Special Education and a Master's of Education in Literacy, both from Mount Saint Vincent University. This background, along with over 30-years of experience in schools, allowed her to enter deep waters in conversation and media interviews. Never limited to

prepared speaking notes, Heather's abilities were quickly recognized by both the provincial and national media and decision makers and made her a 'go to' voice of wisdom, much to the benefit of teachers. In my opinion, one of Heather's highest compliments came from Erna Leger, who was the Executive Assistant to every NBTA President and Executive Director for around thirty years when she said, "We'll never have another one like Heather Smith – she is the total package."

The only thing that made her term as NBTA President more impressive, and that very few people even know, is that she accomplished all of this while fighting thyroid cancer AND only having one vocal cord. I remember going into her office shortly after she shared that fact

with a few of us, hoping to perhaps encourage her to consider slowing down a bit. "No time for that, too much to do!" she said and then went on to explain that she had faced and overcame serious health challenges for decades.

I think Heather summed up her values and the way she lived her life beautifully when she made the following post on social media for Father's Day 2019:

"This post is actually a tribute to both my mother and father, Jim and Isabel MacLaggan. As I age, I realize how much my brother, sister and I learned just by watching my parents. The biggest lesson I believe, besides being honest, kind, and keeping commitments, is the importance of getting involved in our community."

Her belief in the importance of keeping commitments came up this June when I had the honour of attending the CTF Women's Symposium with Heather



Vancouver. While we enjoyed our time together and participation in this important event, I could see that Heather was not well. At one point, I finally got the nerve to ask her if she thought she should be concerned about her health and I will never forget her response - "Ardith, when

you receive a diagnosis of cancer at the age of 19, you spend the rest of your life living as though each day could be your last. The 40 years of my life since then have been a gift. Regardless of what is ahead - I have NO regrets."

Friends received an email from her less than a month later, acknowledging that she had received a terminal health prognosis. How very "Heather-like" it was, when in the same email she also issued a challenge for each of us -

"Be kind to those you meet, teach others to do the same, and try to leave the world in a better situation than you found it."

Heather lived this advice every day and inspired us all to live by her wonderful example. As we celebrate her life here together today, I think the only thing that makes our grief even slightly bearable is the thought that she and her beloved Eric (her husband passed away two years ago) are now re-united and can begin writing the next chapter in their beautiful love story - the thought of that makes me smile.

Heather my friend you were absolutely right - What a GIFT your life has been and how lucky are we to have watched you live it!

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# Educational Leaves: 2020-2021

Deadline for Applications: November 1, 2019

Application Forms: Use Only Forms Marked "For 2020-2021"

#### General

In order to advise teacher applicants by the end of January 2020, the deadline date for applications has been established as November 1, 2019.

#### **Special Information**

- teachers who have a Schedule B contract and who have completed five (5) years of teaching in New Brunswick by the application deadline are eligible for an educational leave up to one full year. Please note that both short-term and full-year leaves are for the 2020-2021 school year only; leaves for January-June, 2020 cannot be considered.
- in keeping with the Collective Agreement, a teacher on an educational leave shall receive seventy per cent of the salary he/she would have received had he/she been employed during the period of the educational leave in the position which he/she held at the time his/her application was submitted.
- a teacher who is granted an educational leave of six
   (6) months or more shall agree in writing to return to the field of public education in New Brunswick for a period of at least one year.
- no teacher shall be eligible for a subsequent educational leave until he/she has been employed as a teacher in New Brunswick for a further one
   (1) year for each two (2) months of an educational leave previously taken.
- the purpose of the leave is stated as follows: "Educational Leave may be granted to a teacher wishing to devote up to a year's study or study/ travel for purposes of retraining, specialization or professional growth."

 Interested teachers should apply to the Secretary, Educational Leave Committee, and forward one copy to the District Superintendent and one copy to the School Principal. <u>No applications</u> for educational leave will be accepted by the <u>Committee if post-marked or emailed after</u> November 1, 2019.

 Applicants shall be advised of the decisions of the Committee by the end of January 2020.

#### Factors Affecting Selection

Although an educational leave must fall into one of three purposes - retraining, specialization or professional growth - the Committee considers confidential comments and recommendations from Principals and Superintendents. These comments are usually directed to the benefits of the leave to the school and district and are an important source of information to the Committee.

Other factors that are considered are:

- distribution by district;
- position distribution (teachers, SPR's, viceprincipals and principals, etc.);
- grade levels;
- past professional involvement;
- · years of experience;
- · number of times teacher has applied;
- benefit to the school/district of the proposed education leave:
- certificate level of the teacher;
- previous educational leave (see note below).

**Note:** Some priority will be given to members who have not previously been granted an educational leave without automatically excluding members who have. Other factors such as the number of years since the previous leave, the total number of applications, the experience of the other applicants and the other criteria listed above shall be considered.

This notice is designed to give information to teachers as early as possible. It is merely a synopsis of the more detailed regulations. Interested teachers should read carefully both Article 37 of the Collective Agreement and the regulations established by the Education Leave Committee prior to applying.

# Two NBTA members have been awarded Prime Minister's Awards for Teaching Excellence


Congratulations to Benjamin Kelly, Caledonia Regional High School, Hillsborough and Andrew Harris, Riverview East School, Riverview.



# Meaningful Work, Motivation and 'The Progress Principle': The Power of Doing What We Love and Loving What We Do

that I am sure you heard repeated by many in the first few days of school. I know I certainly did. So much so, that I decided to adapt it slightly as the inspiration for my first article for the 2019-2020 school year: "What did you learn this summer?" (After all, isn't it much more inclusive anyway? Even those of us who didn't do much of anything have as great a chance to provide an AWESOME answer to that one.)

As I may have mentioned before, some of my best summer learning comes as a result of my week spent with teacher leaders from across Atlantic Canada at our annual Developing Successful Schools (DSS) Conference at Mount Alison University. It was there that our facilitator, Kristin Anderson, introduced me to a little book called "The Progress Principle" by Teresa Amabile and Steven Kramer. This wee book fueled my summer learning from that point forward and was foundational in three of my four "first week of school" workshops for teachers in August.

First, let me share that the authors, Teresa and Steve, work together at Harvard. Teresa's background is in chemistry and business. Steve is a developmental psychologist. Together, their research (recognized and celebrated by Harvard Business Review and the New York Times) has focused on what motivates people to work. While there is no question that they are focusing on adults in work contexts, the more I read, the more I connected their findings to previous learning with students and formative assessment practices in my own studies and classroom. Here are a few highlights:

- The single biggest motivator for people is to 'work on meaningful work'. (We don't have to be finding a cure for cancer necessarily, but we do have to be able to connect for ourselves how what we do makes a difference.) If this is true, even really hard tasks can be motivating.
- The perception of making progress or 'forward


momentum' on that meaningful work is key. When we suffer setbacks or feel that we are 'stuck' we become frustrated and that impacts our perception of satisfaction and emotion surrounding the work.

- The two most common distractions to creativity and perceptions of making 'progress' on our meaningful work are: meaningless tasks and toxic relationships.
- The two forces that can enable progress are defined by the authors as 'catalysts' (clear goals and autonomy) and 'nourishers' (interpersonal events that uplift workers such as encouragement and demonstrated respect and collegiality).

As I reflected on these four points, I realized that much of what was written certainly applies to my own experience and much of what I observe as I watch master teachers at work in their classrooms. What do you think? What lessons might the "Progress Principle" have to your work? Your student's work? I'd love to hear your thoughts!

# Q: My daughter is going to University this year. What's the best way to keep debt levels low?

September is here and students will be starting another year in the classroom. For those heading to post-secondary school, we have some advice to keep debt levels low. If you haven't found a course of study that you are passionate about, it may be wise to take a hard look at your return on investment. This means calculating what it will cost you to complete your education and looking at the earning potential for the jobs you will be qualified to do when finished. When calculating how much money you will need while attending school, it is important to include all living expenses as well as tuition costs, books, lab fees, etc.

Making a monthly budget is the first step toward staying on top of your finances while in school. Budgeting gives you a picture of where your money is going, so you can make informed spending decisions. Making a few simple changes to your spending habits can also make a big difference. For example, if you buy one coffee per day at \$3 per cup, that will end up costing you roughly \$600 over the school year. That \$600 may be one month's rent or a few textbooks. This doesn't mean you can't treat yourself once in a while and furthering your education can be great socially as well! By keeping on top of your spending, you will improve your financial outlook and you will have developed good spending habits that will stay with you well beyond graduation day.

# 2.26M MISSED SCHOOL DAYS

As a teacher, you likely see the impact poor oral health has on students in your classroom. Oral health not only affects our mouths but can also impact our overall health and well-being. # Learning About Plant Growth and The Soil Beneath Our Feet

Any student that walks through Ms. Comeau's doors is very fortunate. Ms. Comeau gives 110% to her students, wanting them to grow and flourish in her classroom. Ms. Comeau approached Tamara Sealy, Executive Director and childhood friend, in the fall of 2016, when she was looking for ideas to implement plants and soils into her classroom. Tamara visited her class on several occasions during the school year, focusing on the science outcomes of soils and plants, as well as her social studies outcomes on what is grown here in our province. Ms. Comeau borrowed one of the foundations Portable Light Gardens to plant and grow beans and marigolds for extra hands on learning for her students. This extra tool enabled Ms. Comeau's students to plant, observe and grow, and form an understanding of the complexity of plants and soils.

Ms. Comeau also implemented cross-curricular activities such as writing pieces and artwork. Nutrients for Life (NFL)

continues to support this exceptional teacher; Bessborough School was awarded a \$500.00 school garden grant to help purchase their own indoor light garden unit so that she can continue to implement hands on learning and growing with her students. Tamara has been back every year to talk to Ms. Comeau's class about soils and plants. This past spring they focused on soils and soil profiles by wrapping up the presentation by making a tasty edible soil profile which was enjoyed by all students.

# IDEA Centre-Innovation, Development, Entrepreneurship and Action

IDEA Centre Classroom and Makerspace at ConnexionWorks

At the core of any classroom lies the directive to prepare students for the future, but we all know that's not an easy task and no one has a crystal ball to predict what tomorrow will look like for this upcoming generation. What we do know is that the economic landscape is shifting. The days of being concerned that a factory's industrial machine will take your job has been replaced with our youth competing with today's automation, robotics, Artificial Intelligence, globalization, new disruptive technologies, and a growing 'gig-economy'.

To say this is a 'shift' in the landscape is mild. The private sector and public sector groups like the New Brunswick Anglophone South School District (ASD-S), ConnexionWorks-Co-Working space, Enterprise Saint John, and Brilliant Labs are showing how collaboration through the IDEA Centre, an entrepreneurial program offered to students from the Saint John Area High Schools, and to students all over the province virtually, is transforming the traditional classroom. Ms. Zoë Watson, Superintendent, Anglophone School District - South, explains "We were thrilled with the opportunities the IDEA Centre provided the students who were part of the first program in the fall of 2017. Engagement in learning is a major focus for our district and a learning environment which allows students to follow their interests and become immersed in a project for which they have passion and enthusiasm such as the IDEA Centre provides is what we want for all of our students. We are very pleased that EECD is partnering with ASD-S in order to provide an online learning opportunity for students to be part of this program. Stacey Wood has joined the team as the distance learning teacher and will be supporting students as they take part in this program in various parts of our district and the province. This type of innovative teaching and learning environment allows students to solve real world problems and use critical and creative skills. We want our students to see the possibilities in our communities and our province and move toward a goal that will make them happy and productive adults."

Stacey Wood, Teacher at the IDEA Centre says the following;"The benefits of supporting an entrepreneurial program outside of a traditional classroom are immeasurable. High school students in 2018 are very much interested in learning that is much more experiential. They have access to information 24/7 but do not always have the opportunity to develop skills and have experiences that will allow them to innovate, solve real-world problems, and learn in ways that are much more meaningful. Today's students want that, they crave that. They are excited to think "Out of the Box". That "Out of the Box" thinking is exactly what the IDEA Centre offers Saint John Area High School students -- a chance to work at ConnexionWorks (a collaborative workspace in uptown Saint John that is home to startups, freelancers, nonprofits and companies of all sizes). "Entrepreneurship connects students directly with their communities" explained Mr. Ries Van Beek, who teaches the face to face students at the IDEA Centre. "It challenges them to identify and help solve problems in their immediate environment and it's that same community that supports their journey to do so. In the past, I have brought in guest speakers to the classroom or helped my students enter various contests. However, this program more intensely and meaningfully connects community mentors and resources with our students to empower their work. I'm seeing a pace of learning and an enthusiasm for school that is off the charts and it makes every day interesting and exciting."

The participating students can feel the difference too. Graham is a grade 12 student who wasn't sure what he was getting into when he signed up, but he definitely isn't looking back. When Graham was asked what the biggest differences were between the traditional classroom and

his time at the IDEA Centre he said; "There couldn't be more of a difference between the two, the classroom feels regulated with limitations both creatively and literally. A simple walk to the coffee machine (yes coffee machine) could turn into a business opportunity by bumping into the right person. Having the class setting in a business environment that is going at its own pace is instrumental to obtaining connections and networking with others."

Ms. Michele Lodge, Project Coordinator for Emerging Entrepreneurs at Enterprise Saint John, an Economic development organization that offers programming to support new start-ups and grow business in the Saint John region says the following about the IDEA Centre, "Enterprise Saint John was very pleased to partner with the Anglophone South School District to create a unique learning environment for students outside of their schools. Having students work in a business environment and interact with professionals on a daily basis to assist them with their own venture was an amazing process to witness. The confidence, maturity and knowledge they gained by taking control of a project and working with adults who treated them as equals cannot be duplicated in a traditional classroom setting. The mistakes made along the way of developing their venture were equally as important as their successes. Learning to cope and overcome uncomfortable situations and roadblocks along the way was a key take away for the students." The goal now was to take students' ideas and work out next steps that included a lean canvas, possible prototyping and pitching their products at the end of semester demo day. Brilliant Labs was there to support with hardware and software needs as students developed their prototypes, and the class and their advisors worked to bring their ideas to life.

On demo day, in late January, the class pitched their products and ideas. "We didn't know how many of our invited guests would show up" Mr. Van Beek reflected, "From little brothers and cousins to Superintendent Zoe Watson and Mayor Don Darling, everyone made time for the students. It was standing-room only!" The students

each had 3-5 minutes to share what they learned during the semester, their future plans, and pitch their business idea. This was the perfect platform for Graham to share his work. "My company, Quick-Fit Sportswear began as an idea for a product 'a hockey sock' that does not require sock tape while providing players with a better overall fit to their shin pad and hockey sock with the adjustable straps installed to the inside and accessible through the rear openings of the sock When I had first thought of the idea, I was under the impression that I'm only a high school student, and starting my own business is far beyond my reach, yet here I stand today with the papers to say I am a legal business owner with a patent pending product. Working on it every day gave me the drive to go bigger and better as much as I could, and working with lawyers and the Sea Dogs were the most surreal experiences thus far."

What is Graham's advice for other students who may like to explore entrepreneurship? "The advice I would give would be to get out of your comfort zone. Go and try what is "socially unacceptable" or things your friends would say you're crazy to do. I was made fun of for thinking I could start my own business, but here I am! Don't stop when things get rough either, that's when you will find out if you're made for this kind of life. Failing leads to succeeding and it is all a part of the process, you will fail in some type of way, it's how you handle that and take lessons from it that dictate if you will succeed. And lastly, you can always be better."

It's clear the benefits shared by the students at the IDEA Centre far exceeded the hopes of their teachers and community organizations. Students have found passion in the work they've accomplished and have learned valuable life skills that will help them be the critical thinking collaborators our communities need in this evolving economic landscape. Lookout workforce of the future, the entrepreneurial classroom has leveled up!!

# Leacher Counselling IT'S TIME TO IN YOUR LESSON PL Wellness Program

eachers are the ultimate planners, you know what will be happening in your classrooms in the next hour, the next day, the next term etc. Can you say the same for your self-care plan? Teachers often put themselves last and wait until holidays or summer vacation to recharge and rejuvenate. We encourage you to rethink that strategy this year. Can you include yourself in your lesson plan, can you make yourself a priority?

Here are some tips to help make that happen, use those that work best for you:

#### For Your Body:

- Meal prepping helps keep teachers on track
- Hydration drink water all day
- Take turns bringing healthy snacks to the staff room or staff meetings
- Infuse your water with citrus/berries/veggies
- Get creative when it comes to being more active
- Take 5 minutes of your prep to walk around the building
- Do some stretches
- Park away from the entrance
- Have a yoga mat in your classroom
- Change your morning routine to add perhaps a 15-minute walk or activity
- Sleep well (no technology an hour before, no caffeine after lunch)

#### For Your Mind & Spirit:

- Write out your goals to help keep you motivated and focused
- Listen to a guided mindful practice before tackling big items like lesson planning, report cards, or parent teacher
- Build formal mindfulness practices into your day (take three conscious breaths many times a day)
- Make your appointments to use your Johnson's services throughout the year - try to have at least one treatment per month as a gift to your body

- Social connection build in time with family and friends, make them a priority - do not wait for the holidays


