NBTA Leadership Workshop Held

Over 140 teachers from around the province, including over 40 early career teachers, participated in the NBTA Leadership Workshop in August, held at the NBTF Building, Fredericton. Each Branch was asked to send delegates involved in local leadership and to include several early career teachers to help them better understand the work of their professional association. Described as "one of the best PD opportunities" attended by participants, their evaluations capture the enthusiastic response to this Leadership Workshop.



elcome to the beginning of a new school year! The summer has just raced by and here you are starting a fresh school year where you will once again make a difference in the lives of so many of our children!

The joy of teaching is in giving, caring, and sharing not only with your students, but also with your colleagues. Collaboration among colleagues is of immense benefit. This was one important theme, among many, that emerged at "Contact 2005", a summer conference of Atlantic teachers held in PEI this summer. It is more fun to share and work collaboratively with your colleagues. As you support others you feel supported because the challenges you face are shared and understood by your colleagues.

The New Brunswick Teachers' Association (NBTA) is your professional organization, which works collaboratively with you and others to support your teaching endeavors.

You Make a Difference!

NBTA is a teacher-driven organization. It is your organization and seeks direction from you constantly, both formally and informally. A structured event that takes place every two years is the Leadership Workshop. NBTA Branch Presidents, Branch Directors and other Branch leaders delegates are invited to attend. This year the event was held August 10th to 12th. We were delighted to welcome 139 delegates, the majority of whom were either early career teachers or first-time attendees. This is a considerable shift in demographics from previous years. It was invigorating to see the young, enthusiastic teachers bubbling with fresh ideas and ready to do positive things in their branches. While the delegates learned about various leadership roles, they also got a chance to network, socialize, and engage in a meaningful dialogue regarding future directions and priorities of the Association. This valuable exercise not only allowed us to set priorities provincially, but also allowed branch leaders to choose at least one area they wish to focus on at the branch level. I am hopeful that each NBTA Branch will implement one new idea or initiative this year. Look for these dynamic people in your branch this

As stated, one of the main goals of the Leadership Workshop is to seek input and direction from the delegates for future course of action. As the delegates deliberated over priorities ranging from concerns related to early career teachers, teacher demographics, discretionary days, and the lack of adequate resources, class composition clearly emerged as an area of concern.

Class composition has linkages with virtually all aspects of public education, including adequate funding, literacy programs, vocational programs, sufficient resources, suitable materials, and support services required to address the needs of our students. Currently, the public education system is under-funded and

is not meeting the needs of all of our students properly. Our students need a wide range of programs and services to be able to succeed and contribute to our society in productive ways.

The government is cognizant of the class composition-related challenges that teachers face on a regular basis. For this reason, Prof. Wayne MacKay (a Dalhousie University law professor and former president of Mount Allison University), has been hired by the government as an independent consultant to conduct a review of inclusionary practices in New Brunswick. Prof. MacKay is expected to provide a final report to the Department of Education, October 2005. In addition, the NBTA ad hoc Committee on Inclusionary Practices will present a final report to the October Board of Directors, so class composition will remain in the forefront.

In the Hon, Madeline Dubé, we have a Minister of Education who has expressed a genuine interest in improving the learning conditions of our students. At the Leadership Workshop, we welcomed the Assistant Deputy Minister of Education (ADM), Mr. Terry McInerney, to a presentation entitled "Leading for Change", which summarized the results of NBTA's survey on inclusionary practices. He not only heard this presentation prepared by the ad hoc Committee on Inclusionary Practices, but also answered questions and listened to concerns raised by the leadership delegates. We are hopeful that given this kind of dialogue we can help to bring about improved learning conditions for our students.

During the year I am looking forward to working with you, and for you. Your input is valued highly. Do maintain constant contact and share your ideas, successes and other happenings in your schools.

I wish you every success in this school year.

DSS and CONTACT: Exceptional PD Opportunities

his summer saw opportunities for New Brunswick educators to join with their colleagues from Atlantic Canada for two outstanding professional development experiences.

Developing Successful Schools (DSS) took place at Mount Allison University in Sackville, July 3-7, 2005. Sixty-seven principals and vice-principals from the Atlantic region joined together to explore the issues around Managing Conflict Within Strong School Cultures. Facilitator Nancy Hinds, a staff officer with the British Columbia Teachers' Federation, shared her expertise and promoted the development of skills to enable administrators to respond to the myriad of conflict situations which permeate today's schools.

On August 14-17, 2005, over 140

classroom teachers (23 from New Brunswick) participated in the annual Conference on New Techniques and Classroom Teaching (CONTACT). This year's theme, *Great Teaching: A Question of Balance,* created opportunities for classroom teachers to share, grow and learn in an atmosphere that promoted both professional learning and a spirit of fun. Sessions included:

- Teachers as Leaders
- Differentiated Instruction
- Authentic Assessment
- Co-operative Discipline
- Successful Intelligence. For the first time, francophone sessions were also offered.

New Brunswick teacher, Julie Kilcollins, presented a well-received session related to the challenge of grading and reporting in a meaningful manner.

With the demise of the Department of Education Summer Institute program, **DSS** and **CONTACT** have assumed an even more important role in the professional growth of New Brunswick teachers.

Teachers and administrators are encouraged to consider attendance at next year's programs. **DSS** will once again take place the first week of July 2006. Next year's theme will be *Leading Your School Toward More Authentic Assessment*.

CONTACT will take place in Corner Brook, Newfoundland the week of August 6, 2006.

Information on both of these programs will be available in the March 2006 *NBTA News*. Plan to attend one of these exceptional events.

Educational Leaves: 2006-2007

Deadline for applications:

November 4, 2005

Application Forms: Use Only Forms Marked "For 2006-2007"

General

In order to advise teacher applicants by January 13, 2006, the deadline date for applications has been established as November 4, 2005.

Special Information

- teachers are eligible for educational leave of less than one full year (although full-year leaves are still available). Please note that both short-term and full-year leaves are for the 2006-2007 school year only; leaves for January-June, 2006 cannot be considered.
- in keeping with the collective agreement, a teacher on educational leave shall receive seventy per cent of the salary he/she would have received had he/she been employed during the period of the educational leave in the position which he/she held at the time his/her application was submitted.
- a teacher who is granted an educational leave of six
 (6) months or more shall agree in writing to return to the field of public education in New Brunswick for a period of at least *one* year.
- no teacher shall be eligible for a subsequent educational leave until he/she has been employed as a teacher in New Brunswick for a further one (1) year for each two (2) months of educational leave previously taken.
- the purpose of the leave is stated as follows: "Educational Leave may be granted to a teacher wishing to devote up to a year's study or study/travel for purposes of retraining, specialization or professional growth."

Administrative Information

- Application forms and detailed regulations may be obtained from your school district office.

— Interested teachers should apply to the Secretary, Educational Leave Committee, and forward one copy to the School Board Office and one copy to the School Principal. No applications for educational leave will be accepted by the

Committee if post-marked after November 4, 2005.

 Applicants shall be advised of the decisions of the Committee by January 13, 2006

Factors Affecting Selection

Although an educational leave must fall into one of three purposes — retraining, specialization or professional growth — the Committee receives comments and recommendations from Principals and Superintendents. These comments usually are directed to the benefits of the leave to the school and district and are an important source of information to the Committee.

Other factors that are considered are:

- 1. distribution by district
- 2. male/female distribution
- 3. position distribution (teachers, department heads, subject coordinators, vice-principals and principals,
- 4. grade levels
- 5. past professional involvement
- 6. years of experience
- 7. number of times teacher has applied
- 8. benefit to the school/district of the proposed educational leave
- 9. certificate level of the teacher

Some priority will be given to members who have not previously been granted educational leave without automatically excluding members who have. Other factors such as the number of years since the previous leave, the total number of applications, the experience of the other applicants and the other criteria listed above shall be considered.

The composition of the Educational Leave Committee is as follows:

Department of Education: two representatives; New Brunswick Teachers' Association: Indu Varma; Association des enseignantes et des enseignants francophones du Nouveau Brunswick: Louise Landry; New Brunswick School Districts: two representatives;

New Brunswick Teachers' Federation: André Deschênes, Bob Fitzpatrick - Secretary.

This notice is designed to give information to teachers as early as possible. It is merely a synopsis of the more detailed regulations. Interested teachers should read carefully both Article 37 of the Collective Agreement and the regulations established by the Educational Leave Committee prior to applying.

Checking Your Pay

inally! Twenty-three months after bargaining began, teachers are finally seeing a difference in pay as the negotiated increases take effect. During the next few weeks you should check your "Notice of Deposit" because the amounts you receive will reflect the following changes:

- On September 2, teachers will be moved to the new pay scales. The pay scales have changed considerably. In the previous contract, for example, a Certificate V teacher at the top of the scale would receive \$57,529 per year or a gross of \$2202.27 bi-weekly in a 26 pay year. As of September 1, 2005 the same teacher would receive \$60,770 per year or a gross of \$2,337.30 bi-weekly.
- On September 16, the retroactive

pay owed will be paid. This amount will vary from teacher to teacher. Calculating the "retro" pay is a very difficult task because of the hundreds of different

unique employment situations. These situations include teachers who have retired in 2004 or 2005, people who have been on deferred leave, teachers who have been on educational

leaves, teachers who have been employed part-time or who have obtained a contract during the school year, teachers who have taken pre-retirement leaves – the

list is virtually endless. Although it has been frustrating waiting for the retroactive pay, individuals in payroll at the District and Department level have needed every minute of the three months to complete these calculations.

The September 16 "Notice of Deposit" will provide a breakdown of the amount of retroactive pay and regular pay, and that "Notice of Deposit" should be examined. However, the amount received will vary from person to person.

Even those individuals who have had exactly the same certificate levels and the same employment situations during the past two years may receive different

> amounts because they have different deduction codes for income taxes. If you compare your "retro" pay with colleagues, do not be surprised to learn that the amounts do not match.

not match.

On September 30, a third pay period occurs in the month.
Recall that typically two months per year have a third pay period. This third pay is different from the other two monthly pays because many deductions are not taken from the gross – including

dues.

You should note that the amount deducted for dues this year is different, as well. Regular member dues have not changed for the current year. They remain at \$27.45 for 20 pay periods. (The first two pays in each of the ten months during the school year.) However, an additional \$1.90 is being deducted from each of those pays to recoup the extra costs incurred last spring when money was borrowed by the Federation for negotiation purposes. The total dues amount being deducted is \$29.35 over 20 pays.

 Finally! On October 14, teachers should begin receiving 'regular' pay. The amount received should remain stable until March 3, when another pay increase is due.



Desperately Seeking Success

One of the great joys of the teaching profession is the recurring newness that accompanies the role. Each September we return to our classrooms and schools, refreshed, renewed and recommitted to 'have a good year'. The new plan book is crisp and unwrinkled, the classroom is freshly scrubbed (and maybe, if you are lucky, painted!), the new outfit is selected (well, I always had one for the first day), and the class list usually reveals a new set of learners...ready to meet the challenges of the new grade.

The same sentiments echo in staff rooms and hallways in schools throughout the province. I am delighted to hear so many teachers talk about being 'ready', even 'excited' for the new year to begin. For the most part, we love our work and we have chosen it, not because of the salary, the holidays or the professional respect, but because we like kids and want to help them grow and learn.

Students, too, share this September optimism. Even the most cynical will think about the all important first-day clothes (never underestimate the importance of image), rub their hands over the clean notebooks, and set off for school with both trepidation and resolve. This year will be different...better...this year I am going to do really 'good' in school (maybe the grammar lessons will kick in!)

The question I want to pose as we all begin this journey is how will we, at the end of this new year, determine if we have been successful? What does success look like? How will we know when we are 'there'?

For teachers, we may determine the success of our year in very subjective ways...its feels good, we had few or no parental complaints, the kids were good and everyone 'passed', the assessment scores showed an upward trend....there may be many different ways in which teachers sum up their year and gauge their success. It is often a very personal summation, based on a set of internal values and priorities.

For students, however, success is often more difficult to describe. It is much easier to describe failure and so many students not only experience it, but internalize it in a way that defines who they are. T.D. Knestrict, assistant professor of Education at Xavier University in Cincinnati, describes the pain of

being 'different', a student who, despite efforts, could not find success in the mysterious world of school. In "Memories From the 'Other': Lessons in Connecting With Students" (Phi Delta Kappan, *June 2005*), the author recounts the progression from his first optimistic days at school to the depths of despair into which he eventually sank once he learned the 'lessons' of school-that he was different, stupid and not worthy. (This is a very powerful article, a testament to both the negative and positive power teachers...let me send you a copy!)

In this context, however, I am not focused on Knestrict's passionate plea for teachers to develop caring relationships with students. Rather, I come back to the idea of determining success. How clearly do we articulate to our students what they need to do in our classrooms to be 'successful'?

There are several ways to respond to this question...you will have to decide how you would answer it and

you may need to ask more questions first. Begin by asking yourself if you always have a very clear picture of what you expect, whether that be related to behaviour or achievement. I can recall, for example, (not with pride), beginning to mark a huge stack of assignments for my grade 9 Language Arts class. I started by methodically going through the pile and 'sorting' into best, middle and lowest piles. I then began examining each pile and determining the degrees of quality within each pile, then assigning a grade that seemed (at the time)

relevant. When I look back on this not very stellar example of determining who was 'successful', I realize that I didn't begin with a clear picture of what an exemplary product would be, and I certainly hadn't conveyed that to my students. Rather, it became an exercise in comparing students' work, one with another, and obviously resulted in a set of winners and losers.

Assessment guru, Rick Stiggins, says that all students can hit 'the target' but not if the target is moving or hidden. If we do not begin with a clear description of what the student is expected to know and do, and then convey that in language and terms that the student can understand, how can we expect our students to know what success looks like?

Dr. Ruth Sutton, speaking at the Assessment Training Institute's Summer conference, explained that teachers must follow the following steps:

- 1. Start with a clear task (this is the 'what' of achievement).
- 2. Clarify the purpose of the learning (kids need to know why).
- 3. State, share and show (model, demonstrate, show examples of high quality).
- 4. Break the task down into criteria (the steps, parts required to be successful).

Coach students into using the criteria to critique their own work (long before you use any form of evaluation).

In fact, if I were to add one word to every teacher's vocabulary for this new school year, it would be 'criteria'...even in kindergarten! You can clearly establish the 'criteria' for lining up to go to recess, the 'criteria' for a successful story, the 'criteria' for a group presentation. Once this criteria is understood. (i.e., students know exactly what is expected to succeed), they can become more involved in meeting success. They can evaluate their work and the work of their classmates, against the criteria, as they work to improve it.

Teachers also need to be giving feedback throughout the learning process...not just at the end of an assignment (like my poor grade 9 class!). So often we only indicate what is wrong ...a process that soon wears down the struggling learner. Or we give vague feedback to 'good' students..."well done" doesn't really tell anyone much about what the student is doing well or needs to work on.

Sutton suggests that you do periodic assessments using two coloured highlighters...green to highlight what portions of the assignment meet the criteria, and pink to point out things that are not up to standard (yet!). This allows the sort of feedback that encourages students to work toward improvement...and gives them hope that they can 'hit the target'.

I know of one teacher who uses rubrics effectively to help establish criteria for success. Her final rubric column doesn't indicate poor or unsatisfactory work, but rather it is labelled *incomplete*. She tells all of her students that everyone will be successful; that if the work hasn't met the standard for success, it is incomplete...not a failure, not worthless...just not 'there' yet.

So, am I crazy to begin a September column by talking about how we will determine if our year is a success? I think not. If we do not begin with the end in mind, if we do not have a clear idea of what we expect, both for ourselves and our students, how will we be able to determine if we have been successful? Perhaps establishing clear criteria can be one of your professional goals... it may just be helpful to both you and your kids.

Middle School Math

Two short articles from the April 2005 issue of *Middle Ground* offer some specific and practical ideas for middle school math teachers. "Add Pizzazz to your Middle School Math Class" gives directions for activities to reinforce concepts, while "Reading Middle Grades Math" highlights the challenge of teaching students to 'read' the language of mathematics.

Relationships (again)

I am always drawn to articles that promote the importance of establishing positive relationships with our students. My own (long) classroom experience convinced me that without this, it really doesn't matter how much we know about our subject. Rick Wormeli agrees and gives concrete suggestions to help in "It's the Relationship That Matters" (Middle Ground, April 2005).

Grading and Reporting

I had the good fortune to spend a day with Ken O'Connor, a Canadian educational consultant who is considered one of the leading experts in the area of grading and reporting as a sort of subset of the whole assessment piece. I highly recommend his book, How to Grade **for Learning** (*Corwin Press*) for great examples, stories, summaries of research and a wealth of material that should fuel a great deal of discussion in staff meetings! Many of our grading practices have not changed for decades....and sometimes we may find it interesting to re-examine some of these practices and ask, "why do we do it this way?"

Phys Ed

Once again Phys Ed teachers are

preparing for the fall **Remember When** workshop. I encourage teachers to make an effort to get to this well-organized, skill-based professional conference.

I share, too, a great little article of interest to both Elementary and Middle School Phys Ed teachers called **Unlikely Partners - Brain and Brawn Come Together in Phys Ed Class**. (*ATA Magazine*, Summer 2005).

Administrators' PD

I hope to see many administrators at the CAP Leadership Symposium which is being hosted by the NBTA In School Administrators' Committee in Moncton, October 13-14. There are still registration spots...see the ad on page 11 or go to our website, www.nbta.ca, to register.

It's That Time Again!



The Johnson's Research Award is available to any member of the NBTF Group Insurance Plan who is a statutory member of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association and intends to undertake an educational study related to priorities of the NBTA. Teachers on educational leave, contractual leave of absence, and deferred salary leave are also considered eligible for the purposes of this award. Funding for the award program is provided by Johnson Inc.

Purpose

The award is provided to assist teachers in covering the travel, accommodations, conference registrations, duplicating and other costs related to the completion of the research study. No honorarium shall be paid from the award to the recipient. The research undertaken could include standard literature surveys, descriptive or analytical reports based on questionnaires or other data gathering devices, meta-analyses of a variety of related studies or ethnographic research related to New Brunswick schools or educational system.

Conditions

The NBTA will make the awards based on a detailed description of the study. An application should include:

1. Definition of the problem under study



- 2. Description of the research procedures
- 3. Description of intended outcomes
- 4. Description of the relationship to NBTA priorities
- 5. Cost estimates specific to the award

Award

The NBTA will provide, upon request from the recipient, travel and/or other advances when the award is made. The recipient must provide a financial statement and receipt for all expenses.

Final Report

A final report will be prepared within a time frame mutually agreed to by the Executive Director and the recipient.

Set Goals for Physical Activity for 2005-2006

- 3) Make both your family and individual goal/s meaningful.

- Look to develop a strong desire to begin and reach the desired goal/s.
- 4) Prioritize the goals in relation to their importance to you and the family.
- 5) Set a time period or target date for each goal. This may help with motivation.
- 6) Set goals that are challenging but not out of reach.
- 7) Ensure that your goals are specific and measurable. Be able to monitor progress and make sure you celebrate when you and your family reach each one.
- 8) Goals should be flexible to allow

- for unplanned changes. Be ready to adjust your goals but, do not give them up.
- 9) Take action start with something very doable 15 min walk around your community. Increase duration and intensity. Attempt something different try an activity your family has never done before.
- 10) Keep a record of what you do.
