Minto Memorial High Teacher Receives Dialogue NB Award

Canadian Copyright Bill 35: The Copyright Modernization Act

excerpts from Canadain Teachers' Federation Analysis

"Bill 35 would permit students and teachers to access freely available Internet material for educational purposes."

For the past several years, the Government of Canada has consulted and discussed potential changes to the Copyright Act designed to bring Canada's copyright laws into the digital age. Over this time, the Canadian Teachers' Federation has been actively involved in lobbying the Federal government as part of a *Copyright Coalition*. The objective of this work has been to ensure that such legislation provides protection to teachers and students when accessing material on the Internet.

On June 2, 2010, Minister of Heritage, James Moore and Minister of Industry, Tony Clement, introduced new Canadian copyright legislation, Bill 35: *The Copyright Modernization Act.* Although there are a number of sections of the Bill that will impact education, two are of utmost importance:

- 1. A provision that would permit students and teachers to access freely available Internet material for education purposes, and
- 2. A provision that adds education to the list of purposes for which *fair dealing* is available.

Canada's current Copyright Act makes it an infringement for students and teachers to participate in routine classroom activities where they download, save and share Internet text or images. Bill 35 would permit students and teachers to access freely available Internet material for educational purposes. This provision would permit such activities as incorporating text or images into homework assignments, performing music or plays online for peers, and exchanging materials with teachers or peers. This would ensure that students and teachers can benefit from this rich and varied source of information. However, it



would exclude any Internet material for which the creator has indicated that payment is required.

Fair dealing is a longstanding feature of Canadian copyright law that permits certain uses of copyrighted material in ways that do not unduly threaten the interests of copyright owners, but which could have significant social benefits. Currently, fair dealing in Canada is limited to five purposes: research, private study, news reporting, criticism and review. The proposed Bill would add education as one of the new purposes to which fair dealing applies.

Other provisions of Bill 35 that have the potential to positively impact education include:

- an updating of the "reproduction for instruction" exception to permit digital displays, subject to the commercial availability rule. This is not a huge gain, but would allow the use of whiteboards and similar tools.
- a change to the "classroom performance" exception to allow performances of audio-visual works in the classroom. This was not in the last two bills and is an unexpected benefit.
- a provision allowing educational institutions to record a lesson and make it available for asynchronous viewing by students. This would allow students to reproduce a lesson

for use on a portable device, although the reproduction must be destroyed within 30 days. This would facilitate technology enhanced learning and distance education.

- for school libraries there is a proposed change to the preservation copying exception in that a copy can be made if technology is in danger of becoming obsolete.
- school libraries are now permitted to send and receive a digital delivery of an inter-library loan copy.
- a new exception is proposed that allows educational institutions to record news programs or news commentary programs for later viewing by students without paying royalties.
- references to specific technologies (such as dry-erase boards, flip charts and overhead projectors) have been removed in an attempt to make the existing educational exceptions more flexible for use in the future.

There are still some aspects of the proposed Act that cause us pause. Provisions for penalty for those who circumvent technical measures, such as digital locks, for instance, are severe. There are questions about the degree to which teachers may be held responsible for materials their students may use as part of an assignment. These, and like questions, will be part of the follow-up review work that CTF will do as the legislation proceeds.

For the most part, the Canadian Teachers' Federation is pleased with the provisions contained in this Act. On balance, it represents a fair and balanced approach to addressing educational issues of importance to teachers.

New Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development

Oromocto-Gagetown MLA Jody Carr was named Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development on October 12, 2010, as the NB government, led by Premier David Alward, took office. A graduate of Oromocto High School (1993), he has a degree in Business Administration with a major in economics (UNB, 1998).

In 1995, at age 20, Jody Carr was the youngest

Progressive Conservative Party candidate in the history of New Brunswick when he ran in the provincial general election. Carr has been a Member of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick since 1999. Among other duties, he has been a member of the Select Committee on Education, serving as Vice-Chair. From February to March 2006, he was Minister of Post-Secondary Education and Training.

Deputy Minister Kershaw Retires





Kershaw was appointed Deputy Minister with the Department of Education on October 1, 2003. During Mr. Kershaw's time with the Department of Education, several major changes took place, including:

- Enhanced communication and collaboration with the New Brunswick Teachers' Association
- Transition to Kindergarten Program
- Literacy and Math Mentors
- MacKay Report on Inclusion and related new resources
- New French Second Language model
- Expanded and diversified the Department's international education program. A growing number of schools in China use the New Brunswick curriculum and hire New Brunswick teachers.



Your Political Representation in NB Teacher Organizations

The graphic on p. 6-7 shows the various pathways through which the input of teachers (concerns, opinions, and decisions) guides the work of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association. All roles in the political process are filled by teachers. Hundreds of individuals volunteer their time and energies to ensure that the voices of teachers are heard. Even the members of the NBTA Professional Staff are teachers. We strongly encourage all teachers to consider participating in our professional organization either in a role as a volunteer or simply by making your views known to your representatives.

- Branches The NBTA is organized into 28 local branches. Each is comprised of the teachers from the schools in the branch. There are 1-31 schools in each branch.
- 2. School Reps Each school has an NBTA School Rep. His/her role is to represent teachers at Branch Rep Council Meetings, and to act as a conduit of information between the NBTA and all members in his/her school.
- **3. Branch Officers** A group of local teachers, some elected and others appointed, who undertake specific roles to carry out branch business. They serve on the Branch School Rep Council. Examples include NBTA Branch President, Director, Treasurer and Secretary.
- 4. **Branch Rep Council** This group meets 4-10 times per year, depending upon local practice. Members conduct branch business, discuss local issues and concerns, and make decisions in the interest of the teachers in the branch and/or of NB teachers as a whole.
- **5. Branch Committees** The Rep Council may establish local committees such as Professional Conduct and Standards, Professional Development, etc.
- 6. NBTA Director These locally–elected branch officers are members of the NBTA Board of Directors. They bring local concerns to the provincial stage, provide direction to the Association, and report back to teachers in their branches.
- 7. NBTA Staff Six teachers who support, advise, and report to NBTA political bodies (such as Branch Rep Councils and the Board of Directors). They provide information and advice to individual members as well, and are employed by the NBTA.
- **8. NBTA Board of Directors** A group that meets three times per year in Fredericton to discuss the professional concerns of teachers, establish policy, and set priorities for the organization. Decisions are made in the best interest of all NB teachers.

- Board decisions help guide the work of the Association between AGM's.
- **9. NBTF Board** This body performs a similar function as the NBTA Board, but has a mandate of contractual/collective agreement issues rather than professional ones. The NBTF is comprised of the NBTA and its francophone counterpart, the AEFNB.
- **10. NBTA President** Elected to serve a twoyear term through a universal vote of all NBTA members, he or she is the official spokesperson of the organization. Noreen Bonnell is the current NBTA President. She will be succeeded by Heather Smith in August 2011.
- 11. NBTA Executive Committee Five NBTA
 Directors are elected by their counterparts on the
 Board to join the President, Vice-President, and
 Past President on this committee. They meet
 up to 8 times per year, guiding the work of the
 Association between Board meetings.
- 12. NBTF Executive Committee Two of the five Directors on the NBTA Executive are elected by their counterparts to serve on this Committee. They are joined by the NBTA President, Vice-President, Past President and AEFNB representatives. This group guides the work of the Federation between meetings of its Board.
- **13. Branch Annual Meetings** All teachers in each Branch meet in May to receive reports from their local committees and representatives, to elect officers for the upcoming school year, and to choose delegates to the provincial AGM. Through the debate and decisions on various resolutions, these meetings help inform the votes of their delegates at the NBTA AGM.
- 14. NBTA Annual General Meeting This is the highest decision-making body of the Association. Delegates receive reports from the President and Executive Director on the activities of the NBTA over the previous year. They vote on all Branch Resolutions and Board Recommendations, establish budget and dues, and conduct any other business required of the meeting.



"Volun-Tourism" in Puerto Vallerta

The children are all from the community of Magisterio, located outside the dump in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico.

This past summer, I traveled to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico and volunteered at the Children Center of Hope Orphanage and the School of Champions through Feed the Children Vallarta (formerly known as Children of the Dump). Most of my time was spent at the School of Champions volunteering at the summer camp. I had an amazing time teaching English and facilitating games and crafts to the many innocent, sweet, and joyful children who live in and around the dump. Approximately 200 families lived at the dump in the past and, through education and support from Feed the Children Vallarta, fewer and fewer families are depending on the dump for their livelihood.

Currently, through community and international support, Feed the Children Vallarta supports many programs and donates 1000 meals a day to the community of Magisterio. Josh Gillespie, coordinator of the summer camp, states, "The appreciation and desire for education is there. Parents see the benefit and in return their children can get a better future with the education provided."

The School of Champions has helped change the formerly negative image of the community and motivates the government to get involved—the focus is on the children. Feed the Children Vallarta has plans to expand beyond elementary school-aged children to impact more of the community, for example offering middle school-aged children computer and technical trade skills.

School of Champions volunteer Veronica Corona explains that, "Most of [the students] enjoy talking to someone; they can come to the teachers and talk to them about things they can't tell their parents."

This privately-funded school can offer students with low socioeconomic status encouragement and experiences unlike any other they

would normally receive, including technology, English, and physical education. It was an eye-opening experience to see such contrast to the New Brunswick education system, and an opportunity to gain real world experience to bring into my classroom.

As a teacher, I feel very fortunate to have many opportunities throughout the year to travel. I am very passionate about Human Rights Education and Development. For me, it is important to give back wherever and whenever I can. I agree with Veronica when she admits, "Once you start helping others and seeing the problems they have, you value more of what you have."

Not only has Feed the Children Vallarta helped in the area of Education, but they have also assisted in the development of the area around the dump. Drinking water, showers, bathrooms, washing machines, and feeding and clothing programs are now available. The people around the dump are proud and work hard to support their families. The chil-

dren from the dump, who are always happy and full of life, made me realize that life is less about material worth and more about life's experiences and making connections.

There are many opportunities available to teachers to travel and make a difference in whatever area they are passionate about. We are part of an amazing profession where we can make use of our skills locally or abroad. Travel "volun-tourism" is the new wave of experience which many teachers can get involved in for short-term or long-term placements. With a little research, teachers will be surprised to see the many opportunities available in every area of interest and place imaginable. From volunteering with children, to working with sea turtles, the sky is the limit. I know teachers like to travel so why not include some volunteering for a charitable cause while away on your dream vacation? Your students will be the beneficiaries of your learning.

Partners for Youth

Founded in 1994, Partners For Youth Inc. is a provincial notfor-profit organization built on a community partnership model that assists youth to learn, grow, develop positive self-esteem and gain the skills to make positive life choices. We work with children and youth who are: not able to join other organized groups; having trouble finding a social group; having difficulty with relationships; having difficulty with participation and commitment; subject to peer pressure; unable to assume responsibility for their actions, and who may have varied risk factors in their lives.

Our adventure-based approach is unique and certainly one of a kind in New Brunswick and indeed across the country. Our work with children as young as age eight is focused on child development, social skills and overall education.

We work with children and youth who are often left behind by other initiatives and organizations. Their complex needs and very challenging behavior is often problematic



and causes great concern within their school and community life. Our adventure-based approach with these children is very successful and our commitment to them for at least a three-year period is unparalleled. Since our founding we have graduated over 2000 young people and recently in the last year we have worked in 49 schools across the province with over 550 at-risk children and youth.

We are a volunteer-driven organization where only four full-time staff coordinate and develop the projects across the province. Our volunteer base is approximately 125 and this enables us to put more resources into each child and youth as opposed to the administration costs of the organization.

Our funding comes from many sources and one of which is our 12 Trips in 12 Months event which gives participants who purchase a ticket the chance to win one of 12 trips drawn during the calendar year. School-Based Learning Team Grants 2011

In a true Learning Community, everyone learns.

What is a School-Based Learning Team?

A School-Based Learning Team (SBLT) is a team of 3-5 teachers from a school who decide to work together to examine some aspect of student learning with the goal of studying, collaborating, sharing and learning to improve instructional strategies that will lead to improved student achievement.

Can you give me an example of what a SBLT might attempt to accomplish under this program?

An Elementary Team might determine, by examining their school achievement data and their students' performance, that their students seem weak in the area of measurement. The team might work towards identifying/ developing strategies to improve this area of student learning. The teachers might try various teaching techniques, learning from one another or experts, and continue to compare the progress of their students as a result of the efforts of the Learning Team. Likewise a Middle School Learning Team might recognize that their students are weak in poetry; a High School Math Team might decide to focus on improving their students application of geometric principles.

• What is a School-Based Learning Team Grant?

A SBLT Grant is a \$1000 grant that will be awarded to a school upon successful application to the NBTA Committee established to administer the grant fund. The focus must be student learning.

What is the purpose of the grant?

The grant is intended to support the work of the Learning Team.

Such support may include providing some release time for the team to meet, purchasing resources to support the efforts of the team, accessing expertise in the form of resource people, etc.

How often should the team meet?

The SBLT grant extends from the calendar year January to December 2011. The team is required to meet a minimum of 18 hours throughout the year for which the grant has been awarded. Team members determine when the meetings will take place.

\$1000 Grant for your School to Support Student and Teacher Learning

• How is a SBLT different from a study group?

In many ways the SBLT has similarities to a study group in that teachers are working together to grow and learn. However, the Learning Team must focus on an aspect of student achievement and work towards improving the achievement levels of their students in that area. Actually examining student work is an important part of a Learning Team.

• Will there be any help for the SBLT to get started?

Yes. The Staff Officer for Professional Issues for the NBTA will meet with each Learning Team to help them launch their work. A template for recording the work of the team will be provided and protocols for examining student work will be introduced. These guidelines are intended to provide a framework for both accountability and productivity

but will not restrict the direction and creativity of the team.

How many grants will be available?

For the calendar year January 2011 – December 2011, there will be five \$1000 grants available.

How does my school apply?

Complete the application form accompanying this article or found on the NBTA website (**www.nbta. ca**). A school may submit more than one application provided the guidelines above are represented in each application.

Deadline for applications is December 17, 2010. Successful applicants will be notified by January 14, 2011.

Why should my school consider creating a School-Based Learning Team?

All teachers strive to do their best, but so much more can be accomplished if teachers can work together, share strategies and improve their instructional techniques. Students and teachers all benefit. In a true learning community, everyone learns. A School-Based Learning Team is one more step toward the creation of such a learning community.

The guiding question of a School Based-Learning Team is: "What is happening differently in our classrooms as a result of what we are doing and learning in our Team?"

the back includes a number of the documents that may come in handy in the world of professional learning:



It seems that the fall issues of most of the journals that NBTA subscribes to were chock-a-block full of articles to inspire, grow and learn from! If any of the following tweak your interest, drop me an email and I would be happy to send a copy along to you.

Teaching Without Talking by Jacqueline Hansen (*Phi Delta Kappan*, August 2010, Pg. 35) reminds teachers that the nonverbal messages that we send to students through proximity, eye contact, gestures and touching can speak far louder than the words we choose. An interesting read!



What Elementary Council Can Do for You!




I crossed the finish line after 10 km I knew there would be other marathons in my future.




Multimedia Learning Kits

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



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

The Historica-Dominion Institute is challenging students from sea to sea in its new program – the Canadian Citizenship Challenge.


