NBTA Board of Directors October Update

inister of Education, Kelly Lamrock, discussed a number of current issues with the NBTA Board of Directors meeting on October 24, 2007. The Minister spoke to the representatives about funding for education, the Innovative Learning Fund and the French Second Language Review. He indicated that he would like to see a reduction in the number of curricular outcomes in order to allow for more experiential learning among students. Mr. Lamrock responded to many questions from Board members and expressed the importance of teacher input into various improvements he is seeking in the education system.

FSL Review Commissioners,
Patricia Lee and Jim Croll,
visited the Board and explained
the process of the review they are
conducting into French Second
Language delivery in the province.
They emphasized the importance
they are placing on input from
teachers — the front-line
professionals — in their
considerations. A wide range of
other stakeholders are being

consulted province-wide.

Their report will be presented to the Minister of Education at the end of January 2008, and because their mandate has the status of a commission rather than simply a study, it will eventually have to be tabled in the legislature. The NBTA position on FSL delivery was debated and determined by the Board of Directors the day after the visit by the Commissioners. The details of this response and the results of the FSL Teacher Opinion Survey will be available on our website on November 14, coinciding with the NBTA public submission to the Commissioners.

NBTA Priorities: The main issues the NBTA will be concentrating its efforts on over the next two years were discussed and approved by the Board. The Association will focus upon (in no particular order): School Safety, Class Composition, Bargaining, Assessment, French Second Language Input, the Innovative Learning Fund, and Education Finance. The future of the hard copy version of the NBTA News was the focus of significant discussion. Environmental issues, cost, technology, and timelines factors were all examined, as well as the continued demand from many teachers for paper copies. Last year, the Board decided to work toward reducing the number of hard copies of the *NBTA News*. The NBTA Public Relations Committee may have some specific recommendations about the *NBTA News* in early 2008.

There is a new resource available on the NBTA website which guides teachers through the certification process. The interactive tool allows educators to follow their own path through the process and branches out to a wealth

of specific information. It links to forms, policies, and even various educational institutions. This resource is available under Teacher Certification tab on the NBTA website.

The Council Day this school year will take place May 2. Elementary and Middle level teachers will be meeting in

Moncton, while the High School sessions will be held in Saint John. A pilot program of attaching specialist strands to the council sessions will continue at least for one more year. The Elementary Council will host an Art strand, Middle Level - Music, and Phys Ed. will be hosted by High School. A combined council session will take in Moncton for all three levels on May 1, 2009 in Moncton.

So Many Things...

Hello Colleagues and Friends,

I have a hard time believing I have been in the President's seat for nearly 3 months. I have to admit, it has been a bit of a whirlwind. There is always much to do; the big decision is usually how to get it all squeezed in.

Many issues have arisen since the last newsletter. The lack of funding is a huge issue. Although NBTA has been expressing concerns about the lack of resources in recent years, the shortfall in general operating funds at the school level is particularly acute this year. I have been contacted by teachers and administrators in various parts of the province telling me that they are struggling to cope with reduced budgets.

The Innovative Learning Fund (ILF) is seen as a positive step by many, but there have been some teething troubles. The application forms are not user-friendly, and many teachers have spent an incredible amount of time filling them out. This, at a time when teacher workload issues have been identified in "When Kids Come First" as something which must be examined. The truly disappointing part is that some of these teachers will have made these efforts without a positive result. There is not enough money in the fund to support all the applications that have been received. Furthermore, many teachers are applying for money that was previously available from their school or district. Survival of existing initiatives, rather than innovation, seems to be a common motivating factor behind their applications.

The French Second Language review being conducted by the province has been another key area of interest for teachers. A goal has been to ensure that the two Commissioners involved in the study have as much access as

possible to the opinions of teachers. Over 1700 NBTA members responded to our survey in a short two-week period. The Commissioners have met with our Board of Directors and have participacted in discussion groups with teachers representing various FSL programs and those in English classrooms. The NBTA will make its formal submission on FSL in mid-November. I cannot predict the results of their study, but can guarantee that we will have been heard.



The Board of Directors came to Fredericton on Tuesday, October 23, 2007. They had an NBTA Board meeting on the 24th and 25th. School-Based Learning Team Grants

In a true Learning Community, everyone learns.

■ What is a School-Based Learning Team?

A School-Based Learning Team (SBLT) is a team of 3-5 teachers from a school who decide to work together to examine some aspect of student learning with the goal of studying, collaborating, sharing and learning to improve instructional strategies that will lead to improved student achievement.

Can you give me an example of what a SBLT might attempt to accomplish under this program?

An Elementary Team might determine, by examining their school achievement data and their students' performance, that their students seem weak in the area of measurement. The team might work towards identifying/developing strategies to improve this area of student learning. The teachers might try various teaching techniques, learning from one another or experts, and continue to compare the progress of their students as a result of the efforts of the Learning Team. Likewise a Middle School Learning Team might recognize that their students are weak in poetry; a High School Math Team might decide to focus on improving their students application of geometric principles.

➡ What is a School-Based Learning Team Grant?

A SBLT Grant is a \$1000 grant that will be awarded to a school upon successful application to the NBTA Committee established to administer the grant fund. The focus must be student learning.

➡ What is the Purpose of the grant?

The grant is intended to support the work of the Learning Team. Such support may include providing some release time for the team to meet, purchasing resources to support the efforts of the team, accessing

expertise in the form of resource people.

B How often should the team meet?

The SBLT grant extends from the calendar year January to December 2008. The team is required to meet a minimum of 18 hours throughout the year for which the grant has been awarded. Team members determine when the meetings will take place.

\$1000 Grant for your School to Support Student and Teacher Learning

■ How is a SBLT different from a study group?

In many ways the SBLT has similarities to a study group in that teachers are working together to grow and learn. However, the Learning Team must focus on an aspect of student achievement and work towards improving the achievement levels of their students in that area. Actually examining student work is an important part of a Learning Team.

■ Will there be any help for the SBLT to get started?

Yes. The Director of Professional Development for the NBTA will meet with each Learning Team to help them launch their work. A template for recording the work of the team will be provided and protocols for examining student work will be introduced. These guidelines are intended to provide a framework for both accountability and productivity but will not restrict the direction and creativity of the team.

For the calendar year January '08 – December '08, there will be five \$1000 grants available.

How does my school apply?

Complete the application form accompanying this article or found on the NBTA website

(www.nbta.ca). A school may submit more than one application provided the guidelines above are represented in each application.

Deadline for applications is December 7, 2007. Successful applicants will be notified by January 11, 2008.

⇒ Why should my school consider creating a School-Based Learning Team?

All teachers strive to do their best, but so much more can be accomplished if teachers can work together, share strategies and improve their instructional techniques. Students and teachers all benefit. In a true learning community, everyone learns. A School-Based Learning Team is one more step toward the creation of such a learning community.

The guiding question of a School Based-Learning Team is:
"What is happening differently in our classrooms as a result of what we are doing and learning in our Team?"

Making Every Minute Count

s I sit down to prepare this month's article, I find my thoughts returning to a recurring theme - TIME. As teachers, time (especially the lack of it!) is a constant source of discussion. consideration and debate. In the past week alone I have listened as teachers have conferred on maximum instructional times. finding enough time to meet and plan with their colleagues, appropriate timing for assessments, duty minutes, etc. Obviously, this list of "timely" teacher issues could continue, but alas, time escapes me and an NBTA deadline looms!

Whatever the teacher conversation with regards to time, two things are clear – there just isn't enough of it and teachers are masterful at making every minute

Speaking of time, can you believe it's already November! By now you have spent scores of hours with the students you teach. You have come to see their personalities, warts and all. Sometimes your students may delight you; at other times they may disappoint. Some are easy to "love", while others may inspire a small but silent personal celebration when they are absent. By now, some students have pushed your buttons, tested your patience and maybe even caused you to weep with despair or frustration.

"Attitude Adjustments" by Rick Wormelli (Teaching K-8, October, 2003, Vol.34, No.2) may be "timely", especially in the midst of those potential November "blahs". In his article, Mr. Wormelli maintains that cultivating and maintaining a healthy attitude is necessary to keep you at the top of your game in the classroom and beyond. The article proceeds to outline 7 very practical actions that teachers can take to cultivate that "can-do" attitude in themselves, as well as their students.

Considerations for "Making" **More Time in our Classrooms**

While facilitating the Non-Verbal Classroom Management Workshop at Edith Cavell School in October. Claudette Landry shared that teachers who can effortlessly gain the attention of all of their students non-verbally can usually do so in thirty seconds or less. She argued that saving this amount of time on a daily basis, each time a teacher requires student attention, could potentially add the equivalent of 3 weeks of instructional time to the school year. Wow!

Also, in the October issue of Middle Ground, Randy Sprick and K. Daniels co-authored an article called "Taming the Tardies: Every Minute Counts". This school's action plan to tackle the frustrating problem of tardiness is one that demonstrates a whole school approach to facilitate change, bring about positive results and "make"

In my travels and times spent in conversations with many of you over the past few months, one common theme I keep hearing is that of Professional Learning Communities. Many of you want more information for reflection and study. Still others wonder, "Is this a topic or initiative that is unique to my school or district?"

Rick Dufour's recent article, **Professional Learning** Communities: A Bandwagon, an Idea Worth considering, or Our Best Hope for High Levels of Learning? (Middle School Journal – September 2007, P.4-7) offers a clarification of PLC concepts and is therefore an excellent source for those wanting a quick reference on the topic. One thing is for sure, PLCs are being talked about and debated in the world wide educational community and certainly the phenomenon is not limited to one particular geographical area or jurisdiction.


Teacher Timesaver



Non-Verbal Classroom Management Workshop





n Wednesday, October 10, forty-six teachers from around the province spent a very worthwhile day exploring non-verbal classroom management techniques. Research shows that 80 per cent of communication is non-verbal. Training for teachers to increase their non-verbal communication skills is based on the work of Michael Grinder, the national director of Neuro-Linguistic Programming (NLP) in Education.

The workshop was facilitated by Claudette Landry and took place at Edith Cavell School in Moncton. As these photos attest, participants enjoyed her very practical approach that allowed them to practice the techniques she demonstrated with one another throughout the day.



Online Education Portal to Connect Students and Teachers Across Canada

tudents and teachers in classrooms across Canada now have a direct link to Vancouver 2010, the positive influence of the Olympic and Paralympic Movements and the three pillars of sport, culture and sustainability through an online, bilingual e-magazine ('e-zine') and portal located at

vancouver2010.com/edu. This new portal on the Internet, known as /EDU, serves as the foundation for what is expected to become a lively online interactive community - one that will connect teachers, students (from kindergarten through grade 12) and schools, while celebrating the spirit of the 2010 Winter Games.

In its initial stages, the /EDU portal will target Canadian schools, teachers and students looking to build content and maximize opportunities to showcase local and national education resources. In the coming weeks, a teachers' forum moderated by the University of British Columbia will come online at /EDU. Also among its many offerings, /EDU provides links to programs affiliated with non-profit organizations including the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) and the Canadian Paralympic Committee (CPC), as well as Canadian museums, environmental groups and arts and culture organizations.

Education programs are integral to the mandate of the Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games (VANOC). With the support of the BC Ministry of Education, VANOC is working with representatives from each of the 13 ministries responsible for education in Canada. Each ministry has agreed to work with VANOC to inform and involve teachers in the program; identify the best education resources in sport, culture and sustainability; and collaborate on the development of new educational resources as opportunities arise.

"Vancouver 2010 creates a climate of possibility that helps us discover the greatness inside ourselves," said John Furlong, VANOC Chief Executive Officer. "Through the Vancouver 2010 website, /EDU will connect students to students, teachers to teachers and schools to schools from across Canada. It will provide them with Olympic and Paralympic resources to help them set their own podiums and identify their own dreams."

"We're supportive of VANOC's on-line education program /EDU because much like the athletes who compete at the Canada Games, each Province and Territory can show what they have to offer" said Sue Hylland, President and CEO of the Canada Games Council. "/EDU is also a means of bringing sport and many other aspects of the 2010 Winter Games into communities across Canada through youth in the classroom, a goal that we already support through our outreach to youth in schools."

The evening was concluded with a discussion in a circle about "what did I learn tonight?" Some of the

responses of parents:

- His attitude towards school has changed towards the positive, as he smiles more and talks about school with happiness.

- I realize now how my daughter is learning and is so happy about it. I must rethink how I deal with her, I am from the old school.
- I know why my
- daughter is so eager to get up for school; it's because of the Tribes process and her wonderful teacher.
- I learned that Tribes is a great way to learn.



Guidance Professional Development

nother busy year at school has begun, and year three of the Department of Education, Provincial Comprehensive and Developmental Guidance and Counselling Committee work has begun.

This committee started meeting under the direction of John Tingley, Learning Specialist for Educational Programs and Services. Guidance Counsellors across the province were selected to represent each District, for a minimum three-year commitment. Now it feels as we truly have "only just begun".

The Committee members are:

We began our work by looking at resources many of us are using now, and recommending resources to be added to the provincial curriculum documents. We have also met to address concerns on the new Guidance Certification process. We looked at possible barriers to the process, and what specific training individuals will be looking for.

Presently, we are acting as a sounding board for the MacKay Report, and developing PD opportunities that will complement the *When Kids Come First* document. Perhaps one of our most important tasks is recommending those opportunities for Guidance Counsellors/teachers. As a working

committee, we have had the chance to discuss the real issues facing guidance personnel on the front lines, and to influence upcoming conferences and workshops. We welcome input from all of our Guidance colleagues.

Another important part of our work has been to navigate the Guidance and Counselling Portal. We encourage everyone to check it out on a regular basis, as we will be posting upcoming PD sessions, conferences, and resources. (https://portal.nbed.nb.ca/sites/gc/default.aspx) Please feel free to contact anyone on the Advisory Committee with your suggestions or concerns.

Comprehensive Skill-Based Workshop

ore than 175 Guidance Counsellors from across the province are still feeling the impact from a two-day training opportunity held in October 2006 in Moncton. This conference became a reality through the sponsorship of the Department of Education, along with organization and coordination by John Tingley, Provincial Learning Specialist for Guidance and Counselling.

Representatives from various districts, Public Safety and Police personnel, individuals from First Nations, as well as a number of members from the media, joined the Guidance Counsellors to compose an audience of approximately 250. As the conference began and a rather quiet, unassuming individual approached the podium, little did those in attendance appreciate the life-changing experience that would

soon be theirs.

The conference speaker, Mr. Kevin Cameron, held many credentials. He was a Board Certified Expert in Traumatic Stress. His biography included training as both a marital and family therapist, as well as a play-based therapist. He had worked with inner-city housing projects in Halifax, street kids in Edmonton, and in a variety of roles in child welfare and young offender systems throughout Alberta.

During the tragic 1999 school shooting in Taber, Alberta, Mr. Cameron led the Taber Crisis Response Team. Two weeks later, he

was seconded by the Alberta government to the Taber response project. In this capacity, he began the development of the Traumatic Event Systems (TES) model that helped to explain, describe and predict significant aspects of the traumatic aftermath from the school shooting locally, provincially and nationally. This model included a basis for differentiating between crises vs. traumatic events, and a process for individual and systems recovery.

Mr. Cameron's mandate for this October conference was to deliver a two-day, Level 1 Training in Threat Assessment which would provide a draft for those in attendance. Individual Districts would build on this training to create the protocols appropriate to address their individual needs. Ultimately, this comprehensive skill-based workshop was structured for those professionals in the school and community system (school principals, police, student services coordinators, therapists, etc.) who were, or would be, conducting the actual threat/risk assessments. Mr. Cameron shared numerous real case studies which were a key part of the training.

By the end of the two days, a new field of student threat/risk assessment had been presented. Those attending had gained insight into known school shooters and other violent youth, as well as the

thousands of threat-makers in the aftermath of these high profile school shootings. Attendees were also provided protocols for threat\risk assessment and appropriate team interventions.

Various school districts, along with other professionals throughout the province, have remained in contact with Mr. Cameron and have since lined up further workshops including Threat Assessment Level 11 Training. The knowledge base from which Kevin Cameron drew, along with his practical, well organized and captivating delivery, left participants equipped to better face some of the challenges that they could face around assessing potential threats and risk.

Career Connections Conference

nowing that counsellors are constantly being asked to assist students in their post secondary decisions, there is naturally a huge requirement to understand the latest career development trends and ideas. When I was in high school three decades ago, my only involvement with my counsellor was one session whereby I completed an interest inventory, which was then scored and discussed. This one-off session did little to assist me in considering a future career. Nowadays we know that career development is an ongoing process from birth to old age. In order to be of any real assistance to students, guidance counsellors need to know how to assist students as they prepare them to succeed in the real world.

One way the Province of New Brunswick, Dept of Ed., Programs and Services Branch has addressed this need was by hosting a two-day Career Connections Conference at the Crown Plaza Hotel in Fredericton, October 16 and 17, 2007. This two-day conference

focused on the developmental nature of careers, providing counsellors from across the province with the opportunity to learn the newest career information and ideas in order to assist the students in all provincial schools to enter the world of work.



The keynote speaker was Chad Foster, best-selling author, motivational speaker and television host. Following a two-year cross-country fact-finding tour, Mr. Foster found that young people in America were receiving an incomplete education because they were not fully prepared with the 21st century skills necessary to find satisfying careers. In his latest release, *High*

School 101, Chad Foster outlines an innovative strategy that focuses on preparing students for the various transitions in their lives, from middle school, high school, and into the workplace. Mr. Foster also wrote the informative bestsellers, Teenagers Preparing for the Real World and Financial Literacy for Teens. As keynote speaker, Mr. Foster provided a lot of useful information in an informative and entertaining format.

During the two-day conference, there were 24 individual session choices. Session topics included essential skills in literacy in the workplace; careers in hospitality and tourism sectors: the on-line version of the Real Game, the next generation; Future to Discover, findings and future direction; Road Builders Association of New Brunswick, and Sussex Potash Mining, to name just a few.

Many thanks go out to John Tingley and the members of the Provincial Guidance Advisory Committee for planning and hosting this useful and informative conference.

history. In addition to the academic and cultural advantages, we expect the event to have a major positive impact on the city's economy."


The Federation promotes research, scholarship and teaching in the humanities and social sciences, highlighting a better understanding of the importance of such work for Canada and the world.



During their 24-hour visit, students slept in residence, ate three healthy meals in Jennings Dining Hall, and experienced five hours of interactive lessons led by Mount Allison Summer Ambassadors.

Another 400 + students from New Brunswick middle schools participated in *Mini Explore*, a condensed version of the program. *Explore* is educational, fun and

provides a rare and invaluable look inside the walls of a university campus.

Here's what some students had to say about their experience:


Question: What did you learn?

Lily's "Hero"...

To me, a hero is someone who is there for you; through the good and the bad, someone you can trust, count on and someone that you love who loves you too. Lucky for me, my mom is ALL of those things.

Unlike imaginary heroes, like Superman and Spiderman... my mom doesn't wear a cape, or fly and leap over buildings. She wears a pink ribbon and paddles.

When my mother was 37, she was diagnosed with breast cancer. I was only one and a half, and it was hard on everyone. But it made my family stronger, especially my mom.

Five years later she joined a dragon boat team called "Breasts Ahoy". They are all breast cancer survivors just like her and they've been together for almost 5 years.

A year after she joined that team she published her first book called "Something Completely Different". It's about breast cancer, dragon boating

and her life.

For the past 5 years, I have gone paddling almost every Tuesday and Thursday with my mom and her team. I don't paddle but I do sit on the boat and have a great time. I think a lot of the women, and men on her team. I have made a bunch of nice friends from that team and, one of the best things about it is that my family and I travel all over the Maritimes to go to dragon boat festivals! It is beautiful to see them paddle!

A lot of people don't survive after being diagnosed with breast cancer. If my mom wasn't a survivor, I don't know what I would be doing, where I would be, or who I would be. She's been there for me everyday for the past 10 and half years and she truly is, my hero.


Technology Access and Use in High Schools: the Pitfalls and Promises

omputer access and training are now deemed necessary for young people to become active and productive members of society, and both educators and parents today are investing heavily in time and money to provide this access and training. But is the investment paying dividends?

Since 2002, sociologists Dianne Looker and Victor Thiessen have been studying the use of computers in schools for the Equity and Technology Alliance Research Project. Their research included surveys and interviews in selected schools in Nunavut and Nova Scotia, Canada, and in the Western Cape, South Africa. Based on their findings, a 34-minute documentary, Technology Access and Use in High Schools: the Pitfalls and Promises was made and is available at http://promisesandpitfalls.wordpress .com/. A number of questions that were raised about ICT in the classroom are listed with the documentary and could be used as the basis for discussions between educators about this topic.

Filming for the documentary took place in schools in Nova Scotia, Canada and the Western Cape, South Africa that were interested in participating; they were not chosen for any other reason. The documentary shows remarkable similarities between schools: regardless of gender, class, race or cultural background differences, young people universally enjoy working with computers and believe that they will use them in their future careers, and teachers express similar concerns about the promises and pitfalls of computer use in the classroom.

The documentary supports Looker and Thiesen's finding that it is premature to conclude that ICT use improves young people's educational performance, that there are immense differences in access and use of computer technology in

schools, both between countries and between population groups within countries, and that schools implement ICT into their curriculum in different ways. In some schools, use of ICT appears to be associated with better learning outcomes, while in others it does not. The researchers also found that educational performance is highest among students who use ICT in moderation; students who seldom or never use ICT, as well as those who use ICT very frequently, exhibit poorer academic outcomes.

Did You Know?

A Guide to Better Sleep — Selecting the Best Mattress & Foundation for You

Don't look to the warranty to determine whether it is time for a new mattress. The warranty does not indicate how long your mattress will maintain optimum comfort and support. When you are thinking of buying a new mattress you should think of it in the same way that you would when you are buying a new car. You should:

Test-drive: Lay down on the mattress - in all different sleeping positions. If you don't sleep alone, make sure you go shopping with your partner and lie down on the bed together.

Size: Check that the bed is wide enough to fit you comfortably. Sleep studies show that we turn between forty and sixty times a night and that we require room to move freely so that we don't wake up. Experts recommend that if you sleep with a partner, you may want a Queen or King size mattress.

Support: To check if your mattress offers appropriate support, lie on your back and try sliding the flat of your hand under the small of your back. If the mattress is too soft you will have difficulty getting your hand underneath; if it is too hard, your hand will move freely beneath you as there will be a space between the mattress and your spine. When your hand fits snugly under the small of your back and the mattress, then you know that this will allow your spine to rest in its natural "s" shape.

Care: Improper care throughout the life of your mattress can shorten its life span. See "Mattress Care Tips" for more information.
